



SEVERAL LODGE MEMBERS AND PERSONS KNOWN TO THE LODGE PASS AWAY:

Bill Askew, Bernice Niemala, Arleen Fox and Stan Johnson

William Askew. Bill was born on November 4, 1918, in Washburn, N.D., and died on July 29, 2007, in his home in Esparto, Calif., surrounded by his loving family. He had been afflicted with congestive heart failure and bladder cancer.

Raised in Wadena, Minn., he loved sports and graduated from Wadena High School in 1939. He joined the Navy after Pearl Harbor and proudly served as an Ensign while stationed in Hawaii. He married Valborg Berdahl in 1944 and lived in Minneapolis but soon moved his family to California. He eventually became a civil servant at McClellan AFB. Valborg died of cancer in 1966.

He later married Margaret Karlstad and moved to Esparto. After retiring Bill and Margaret traveled extensively in their motor home and enjoyed spending time with family and friends until she passed in 2000.

Bill was an active member of the Lutheran Church, and our Roald Amundsen Lodge of the Sons of Norway. Services were held on August 5, 2007. A very complete death notice was published in *The Sacramento Bee*.

Bernice Audrey "Bea" (Huseby) Niemala, 89, was entered into rest on July 3, 2006. The lodge only recently received word of her passing. She was a life member of Roald Amundsen Lodge, having joined in 1959. Bea was born August 22, 1916, in Chisholm, Minn., and is survived by her daughter Jeanie Busha, son John Niemela, and several grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Also, she leaves behind three sisters, all of whom are believed to live in Minnesota. She was preceded in death by her husband Henry Niemela.

Bea reportedly was a fantastic cook and enjoyed watching her two favorite shows, "Wheel of Fortune" and "Jeopardy." She also enjoyed her bus trips to Reno, and treasured the time spent with her family.

Arleen Majorie (Ronningen) Fox, a former member of Roald Amundsen Lodge, died on May 24th, 2007. She was born in Astoria, South Dakota on November 2, 1931, and is survived by her loving partner of eighteen years, Tony Schjei, four children, two daughters-in-law, ten grandchildren, six great grandchildren, five brothers, one sister and numerous family & friends. She was a 1949 graduate of Nevada City High School, where she was a cheerleader & loved to help organize class reunions. She was a resident of Sacramento for 58 years. She belonged to various clubs in addition to the lodge, including Rainbow Girls of Nevada City, Sacramento Jazz Society, and the Ladies Auxiliary of VFW Post No.4647. A memorial service was held this past June 1st at the East Lawn Mortuary Chapel, 5757 Greenback Lane, followed by a celebration of her life at the VFW Post in Sacramento. A more complete death notice was carried in *The Sacramento Bee*.

FROZEN DEAD GUY...



The following is from a letter from the District 6 Scholarship Chairperson, Vern Martin:

The 6th District will award three \$1,000.00 scholarships to members in good standing, their children or grandchildren who are Heritage members in any lodge in the 6th District. They must attend an accredited college or university in the USA as a fulltime undergraduate in their sophomore, junior or senior year and have a grade point average of 2.5 or better on a scale wherein A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1 and F=0. These scholarships can also be awarded to those students in their sophomore, junior or senior year of any accredited four-year program at a community college in the USA. When an applicant is deemed worthy of a scholarship (recommended by the 6th District Scholarship Committee and approved by the 6th District Board) the funds will be paid directly to the student.

SONS OF NORWAY FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP ACTIVITIES

2007 has seen another successful scholarship and grant season. We are continually amazed at the number of qualified students applying for Sons of Norway Foundation scholarships. We have funded 27 scholarships for \$68,350, plus Draxten Fund camp monies to the Districts for an additional \$10,768, or \$79,118 in total.

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We have awarded 70 grants to our lodges and their communities for \$30,435 in 2007. We continue to see more Helping Hands to Children grants for Adopt A School and Barnas Norsk Klubb programs. This interest in youth will ripple throughout S/N and build a promising future for our organization. Local Lodge Partnership Grants are also climbing due to the community and lodge cultural programs being creatively presented around the country. Marketing S/N in this manner will lead to more involved members.

Clara Evenson, a long time member of Kringen Lodge in Fargo, ND, left a bequest in her will to the Sons of Norway Foundation that will provide new scholarship opportunities for the S/N youth in District Four to attend Norwegian heritage camps. This will be effective for the 2008 scholarship season. Guidelines are in the works.

GLOBAL WARMING STARTING TO HAVE ITS EFFECT ON NORWAY

The Nordic country will have to adopt a Mediterranean – maybe even a Greek – outlook on life, say experts.

Yes, the proof of global warming extends even to Norway. Scientist and Futurist **Ole Grand-Fibberssen**, of the School of Environmental Shibboleths at the University of Oslo, assisted by his wife **Lena**, have documented irrefutable indications of global warming starting to affect many parts of Norway. This warming, he says, will have effects in at least the following areas:

Agriculture. Already, says Grand-Fibberssen, some Norwegian farmers are growing cotton on the steppes of the Kjølén mountain range. "If this moderate weather keeps up," reports one farmer, Stein Andersen, "we may even be able to sneak a few marijuana plants in among the cotton balls – now *that* would produce an impressive cash crop!"

Interestingly, the American movie classic, *Gone with the Wind*, has been in demand in local movie art houses near farming communities, and there has been a noticeable increase in these new-crop farmers naming their female baby daughters "Scarlett."

Exploration. Olav Heyerdahl, currently retracing the south Pacific voyage route of his famous father in a Kon-Tiki-like raft named *Tangaroa*, is already planning his next sailing in the *Tangaroa*, scheduled for early 2009. His destination will be the North Pole.

"I want to repeat the expeditions of Nansen and Amundsen," says Heyerdahl, "and our trusty raft should be well able to dodge the occasional remnant ice flow. In fact, we expect the weather to balmy, given the midnight sun, and the single greatest commodity that we will have to take on the trip will be no. 15 sun block, so that we all can accomplish fairly even tans."

"I know the Russians recently planted a flag beneath the surface of the water at the North Pole," he continued, "but we plan to be the first to establish real commerce there." It is rumored he and his associates are developing plans for a full service marina at the pole, to be called "Santa's Slips and Eskimo Pie Restaurant."

Raw Materials – Especially Petroleum. Officials of the Norwegian North Slope oil company, *Statoil ASA*, are already anticipating what they are going to have to do to make a market in petroleum in the near future. "After Hilary is elected and the Kyoto Accord is adopted by the US, no one will be able to consume petroleum products without first buying offsetting energy credits," opined one official. "Fortunately, we have elected Al Gore to our Board, and his energy credit company, *Generation Investment Management*, has control of the single greatest energy credit allotment in the world. It won't be cheap, but we plan to market our oil with an appropriate energy credit attached!"

When asked if this would take the price of gasoline to \$9 a gallon in the US, Grand-Fibberssen replied that, yes, "that may be an inconvenient truth." (*con't on next page*)

Ethnic Preservation. Grand-Fibbersen reports that representatives of the Sami peoples have been dispatched to China to negotiate contracts for the manufacture of Hawaiian style shirts utilizing traditional Sami patterns and colors. That way, their clothing traditions will be, sort of, preserved for posterity, even though it is getting too hot to wear reindeer skin pullovers and mukluks."

When asked if the Norwegian department store, *GlasMagasinet*, was coming out with a bunad bikini swimming suit, he replied, "No comment." Lena smirked. Obviously she, like all young scientists today, have irrefutable knowledge of what the future holds.

THE ROYAL NORWEGIAN NAVY

The Royal Norwegian Navy (often abbreviated as RNoN) is the branch of the Norwegian Defence Force responsible for naval operations. As of 2006, the Navy consists of approximately 3,700 personnel (9,450 if mobilized, and 32,000 if fully mobilized) and 70 vessels, including 3 light frigates, 5 heavy frigates, 6 submarines, 6 corvettes, 14 patrol boats, 4 minesweepers, 4 minehunters, 1 mine detection vessel, 4 support vessel and 2 training vessels. The Navy also includes the Coast Guard.

The history of the Norwegian navy is long, and goes back to the *leidang* which was first established by King Håkon the Good on Gulating in 955, although variants of the *Leidang* had at that time already existed for hundreds of years.

During most of the union between Norway and Denmark the two countries had a common fleet. This fleet was established by King Hans in 1509. A large proportion of the crew and officers were Norwegian. In 1709 there were about 15,000 personnel enrolled in the common fleet; of these 10,000 were Norwegian. When Nordenskjold carried out his famous raid at Danakil in 1716 more than 80 percent of the sailors and 90 percent of the soldiers in his force were Norwegian.

The modern, separate Royal Norwegian Navy was founded on April 12, 1814 by Prince Christian Fredrik. The first commander of the navy was Captain Thomas Fasting. On April 1, 1815 the navy's leadership was reorganized into a navy ministry, and Fasting became the first navy minister.

Norway was neutral during World War I, but the navy was mobilized to protect Norway's neutrality which

was sorely tested - the nation's merchant fleet suffered heavy casualties to German U-Boats and commerce raiders. World War II began for the Royal Norwegian Navy on April 8, 1940, when the German torpedo boat *Albatross* attacked the guard ship *Hønes Pol III*. In the opening hours of the battle of Narvik, the old coastal-defense battleships ("panserskip") *Eidsvold* and *Norse*, both built before 1905 and hopelessly obsolete, attempted to put up a fight against the invading German warships; both were torpedoed and sunk. The German invasion fleet heading for Oslo was significantly delayed when Oscarsborg fortress opened fire with its two old 280 mm guns, followed by the 150 mm guns on *Kopås* on the eastern side of the Drøbak strait. The 280 mm guns inflicted heavy damage on the German cruiser *Blücher*, which was subsequently sunk by torpedoes fired from a land based torpedo battery. The *Blücher* sank with over 1,000 casualties among its crew and the soldiers it carried. The German invasion fleet - believing *Blücher* had struck a mine - retreated south and called for air strikes on the fortress. This delay allowed the King of Norway and the Royal family, as well as the government, to escape captivity.

Ten ships and 1,000 men from the Royal Norwegian Navy participated in the invasion of Normandy in 1944. During the war the navy operated 118 ships, and at the end of the war the navy had 58 ships and 7,500 men in service. The navy lost 27 ships, 18 fishing boats (of the *Shetland Bus*) and 933 men in World War II.

The building of a new fleet in the 1960s was made possible with substantial economic support from the United States. During the cold war, the Royal Norwegian Navy was optimized for sea denial in coastal waters, in order to make an invasion from the sea as difficult and as costly as possible. With that mission in mind, the navy consisted of a large number of small vessels and up to 15 small diesel-electric submarines. The Royal Norwegian Navy is now replacing those vessels with a smaller number of larger and more capable vessels. (*Editor's note—Condensed from Wikipedia.*)



We will be painting on a 10 inch round clock (about a 3" clock in center and wood band around it) Julie Anne is teaching a Telemark Rose design on a medium blue background, Kay is teaching a Rogaland style with tulips and bonnet flowers on a light green background. Please make your room reservation with me. I keep the list of who is in which room. You will pay the Hostess for your room when you arrive at Camp. It is not included in your class fee. Bring your current membership card. Members pay \$15 per night; guests pay \$18 for dorms. Only members are allowed to stay in the main house and the cozy cabins. For people who want to room together, I need to receive the list of names with the first reservation. RV's are encouraged as we have a limited number of beds. Members pay \$20 per night for up to four people per RV. Guests pay \$25 per night for RV's. We have electrical and water, but no sewer hookups. Tents are \$15 for up to four people for members, \$18 for non. Pets are \$2 per night. Pets are not allowed in any of the buildings, pool area or sleeping rooms at any time.

It is so much faster and cheaper if I need to talk to you. As soon as the supply lists are available from the teachers, I will send them as I receive your registration form and check. ABSOLUTELY NO E-MAIL RESERVATION REQUESTS. I need the check and registration form. Be sure to send a self addressed stamped envelope for your supply list and class confirmation information if you do not have e-mail. I will not be sending you a supply list unless you send me a self-addressed, stamped envelope or your e-mail address with your registration form. I use Microsoft Word running on an XP program and all attachments will be attached from that program.

The cost of the seminar will be \$78 for registration which includes the class and wood piece all base coated and ready to go, the fire hall clean up and the meals. There will be \$25 cancellation fee, but absolutely no cancellations after September 1.. Class registration fees can be refunded if you have to cancel up to September 1 if there is someone on the waiting list who wants your space. It is difficult for people on the waiting list to take your place if they do not have at least a three weeks to make their plans. Debbie Dawson will again do our cooking. The cost for food for the weekend is included in the \$78 registration fee. The food includes breakfast, lunch and dinner on Saturday and breakfast and lunch on Sunday. You were so very generous and cooperative with the cookies last time. I do so appreciate that. We will ask just one class to bring cookies, and will rotate those classes each time.
