FROM ROALD AMUNDSEN LODGE 6-48 PRESIDENT CAROL FRANCIS:



Hvordan står det til? Quite literally this would translate, how stands it to, but it means how are you (doing)? We are coming out of the summer months when so many of our members are gone to cooler or better or different places, and your president is no exception. The Sierra Nevada mountains remind me of Norway,

and I spend as much time living out of a tent trailer as I can during the summer. But now it is time to focus on an active fall schedule of activities, and to work on the important issues of membership attraction and retention.

I just came back from Camp Norge, where I enjoyed the Multi-Lodge Picnic held annually every August, and hosted this year by Snowshoe Thompson Lodge in Yuba City. Upcoming activities at Camp Norge include Kretsstevne over Labor Day weekend, the Leadership Challenge Workshop III on October 11th, and the 48th Rosemaling Seminar on October 25/26th. We are also having a potluck dinner on September 26th, featuring our young campers who attended Language Heritage Camp at Camp Norge this year.

Camp Norge also produces many new members for Roald Amundsen Lodge. Did you know that you get a discount when you stay there, as a Sons of Norway member? This attracts new members who come with other groups and want to come back on their own without the sponsorship of a Sons of Norway member. Both the past and current directors at Camp Norge have been helpful in signing up new members, with about half from our area.

As I mentioned last month, we are part of District 6,

which is the direct sponsor of Camp Norge. Years of supporting the camp in its infancy stages has depleted the treasury of District 6, which was on the verge of being insolvent and having to return to District 2 in the Pacific Northwest. ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION THREATENED IN NORWAY!**Parliament member wants to curtail subsidies in spite of the country's low birth rate.****Novel new insemination promotions may lessen the problem.****Inge Lønning**

Inge Lønning, Conservative Party member of parliament, wants to take artificial insemination off the list of government financed treatments, making users pay. "It's wrong to think of this as a health matter," he says to daily newspaper *Vårt Land*.

He is not worried that this might create a gulf between the rich and the poor. "It will be the same as with adoption. Here too people have to pay a significant sum," he says.

Users of artificial insemination (AI) have to pay NOK 3,000 (USD 600) today. In addition they have to spend NOK 15,000 (USD 3,000) for the necessary drugs. The state ends up paying about NOK 65,000 (USD 7,000) for each child born as a result of AI.

In 2006 a total of 1,632 children were born by this method. This amounts to 2.6% of all births. Ingvild Brunborg Morton, who works for a charity which helps couples who have difficulty having children, thinks AI is economically profitable for society in the long run. "Norway is struggling with a low birth rate, so we should use all available methods to boost it. One in seven couples find that they are unable to conceive naturally, and the fraction is growing," she says.

"Artificial insemination can only raise the total marginally. I think it would be better to improve conditions for younger women so that they can be encouraged to have their children earlier. A major reason why increasing numbers are finding it difficult to have children is that they are starting later," says Lønning.

Government now promoting other, novel, fertility programs. In fact, in order to increase the number of natural

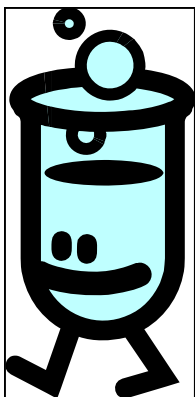
births, the government recently began a program that permits married government workers, aged 20 to 40, to receive special Tuesday afternoon leaves to return home at noon and indulge in natural conception activities. This program, known as "Tuesday Trysts for Tots," has understandably become quite popular. The government even provides a bottle of champagne (one official called it starter fluid) and a provocative DVD.

If the couple cannot participate in their own home for some reason, say because of the presence of a child care provider and young children, the government will provide a voucher for eight hours at one of any number of cheap, tawdry motels that are on the outskirts of most towns. Many couples report that this feature actually enhances the fertilization possibilities.

If the wife involved does not become pregnant within one year the couple is, sadly, dropped from the program, but given an appropriate certificate for "Participation without Conception." If a girl friend, rather than the worker's wife, becomes pregnant, the male worker will have to make up the time he got off, even though the program did lead, technically, to a successful fertility outcome.

Persons aged 41-55 may also participate if they are properly married and can pass a virility test, which has yet to be devised. Men over 55 may participate with a permissive note from their doctor and if properly married to a younger woman; it does not matter if this happens to be a second, third, or fourth marriage, which it usually is.

Although the program has been in existence only a short time, its success has been described as nothing short of "heavy breath-taking." Government day care centers are finally filling to capacity. The program is extremely low cost. And, in an unexpected corollary development, the production of government workers on Wednesdays is setting new records and more than making up for the time lost on Tuesday afternoons. ROALD AMUNDSEN AND THE PANAMA CANAL

One of explorer Roald Amundsen's fondest hopes was that his ship *Fram*, on which he had sailed into Antarctic waters and discovered the South Pole in December 1911, would be the first ship to pass through the Panama Canal, which was then under construction.

Speaking at the Tremont Temple in Boston in January 1913, Amundsen expressed optimism that his hope would be realized before the end of the year when the *Fram* would be passing from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific on its way to further scientific investigations in the Northwest Passage. In Los Angeles two months later, he spoke of the great commercial benefit the opening of the canal would bring to Southern California. He "faithfully promised" his listeners that after the *Fram* passed through the canal and was steaming up the west coast, it would stop for a few days in Los Angeles harbor.

The explorer made a similar promise to the citizens of San Diego.

Writing to Mayor Charles F. O'Neill in late October, he stated that

after its passage through the canal in December the *Fram* would visit that city on its way to San Francisco.

Amundsen had earlier been in touch with government officials regarding his plan and even declared he had received "assurances from Washington" of its success. On Amundsen's behalf, Secretary of War Lindley Garrison, whose department was responsible for construction of the canal, inquired of Colonel George W. Goethals, chief engineer for the project, as to whether it would be possible to grant the famed explorer's request.

Goethals replied that, "It is hoped that we will be able

to pass a ship through the canal before the close of the year, and if that can be accomplished, the *Fram* will have no difficulty in making the transit of the canal and every facility will be offered for its doing so." The headline for this Associated Press story – "Rush Canal for Amundsen" – seemed to sound a note of finality. However, Goethals was cautious in declining to state that the *Fram* would be the first ship through the canal, adding that "no assurances...can be given at this time."

In September of that year, 1913, the *Fram* was at Colon, ready to be taken through the Panama Canal. Captain Torvild Nilsen, who was in charge of the ship at the time, (Amundsen would board the ship on its

arrival in San Francisco) stated that, "he had

been advised that the

Fram would be the first ship to pass through the canal." Goethals, however, sounded a contrary note, declaring that, "the *Fram* would not be the first boat, although it would doubtless be one of the first."

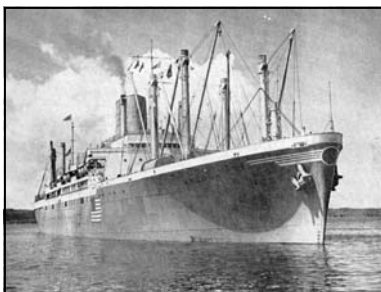
Although the official or ceremonial opening of the canal was scheduled for August 1915, work had proceeded much faster than anticipated and in December 1913 the final "cut" was made to open the waterway for passage. A few weeks later an old crane boat, dating from many years earlier when canal construction was under French sponsorship, was moved from the Pacific side of the Panama isthmus to the Atlantic as

part of the regular work schedule. As a result a ship actively engaged in construction of the canal, the *Alexandre La Valley*, was actually the first vessel to complete the passage, and completely without ceremony or fanfare.

It would be more than six months before regular ocean-going vessels were able to transit the canal in normal operations. Rather than delaying further to an uncertain date, the *Fram* resumed its journey to San Francisco via the traditional route around South America. Progress was slow and nearly four months later the ship had traveled only as far as Montivideo. Because they would not reach San Francisco in time to outfit the *Fram* for an expedition which could last as long as five years, Amundsen decided to order the ship back to Norway and to postpone further exploration in the Arctic for a year. However, the matter of timing was not the only problem, as fund-raising for the project was proving to be much more difficult than anticipated.

Thus, Amundsen's wish that his vessel would be the first to pass through the canal was never fulfilled. In retrospect it was probably unrealistic from the beginning. The extent to which Amundsen and his supporters were fully aware of plans for the official opening of the canal is not known. However, during the very period when he was claiming assurance that the *Fram* would be first, planning in Washington and elsewhere was moving in an entirely different direction. Accordingly, the 1915 event was to involve an armada of

more than 100 American warships to steam from Hampton Roads on the East Coast to San Francisco on the West. As many as four days would be required for the huge fleet to pass through the canal, and their arrival in San Francisco was timed to mark the opening of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, celebrating completion of the canal.

However, those plans also never came to fruition, for

by August 1914 the canal project was finally complete. Two vessels involved in transporting cement from the United States to Panama for construction of the canal, gained the distinction which Amundsen had coveted. The *Cristobal* completed the transit from the Atlantic to the Pacific on the third and the *Ancon* on the fifteenth. Public recognition for being the first was given to the *Ancon*, inasmuch as its passage was scheduled as part of the official "grand opening" of the canal. That event, however, received relatively little attention, both locally and in the international press. News of the canal was totally overshadowed by developments in Europe during the first two weeks of August which culminated in the outbreak of the World War I.

Before concluding this account of Amundsen's aspirations for the *Fram*, it is worth noting that in 1907, the year following his discovery of the Northwest Passage aboard the *Gjoa*, there were suggestions that the tiny sloop should be the first to pass through the Panama Canal, thus completing a circumnavigation of the North American continent. The *Gjoa* had arrived in San Francisco in October 1906 and was moored at the Navy Yard there. It was purchased in 1909, with substantial assistance from Norwegians in the area, and moved to a site in Golden Gate Park where it remained for forty years. Both the *Fram* and the *Gjoa* have been restored and are now preserved at the *Norsk Sjøfartsmuseum* in Oslo. (This article about our lodge's namesake was written by Dr. Richard C. I grew up in west-central Minnesota in Fergus Falls. That part of the country, as many of you

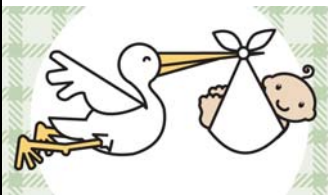

It is time to make your reservations for the adult (18 years and over) fall Rosemaling Seminar at Camp Norge. We will have three classes. The teachers are Julie Anne Droivold, Kay White, and Cherly Seath. We will be using the firehouse for classes.

We will be painting on an 8 inch round shallow bowl. Julie Anne is teaching a Numedal pattern in the style of Sebjørn Kverdalen on a red background. Kay is teaching a Valdres style on a blue background, with red decorated edge. Cherly Seath will be teaching the beginner's class using a Rogaland style designed by Bergilot Lunde from the Vesterheim Collection. The background is a light blue. Cherly says she will be adding on to what Sandra taught in her last class. The design will add two new flower forms and a Rogaland style scroll to tie the design together. Look on the Camp Norge Website for pictures of all three projects: www.Campnorge.com.

Please make your room reservation with me. I keep the list of who is in which room. You will pay for your room when you arrive at Camp. It is not included in your class fee. Bring your current membership card. Members pay \$15 per night; guests pay \$20 for dorms. Only members are allowed to stay in the main house and the cozy cabins. For people who want to room together, I need to receive the list of names with the first reservation. RV's are encouraged as we have a limited number of beds. Members pay \$20 per night for up to four people per RV. Guests pay \$25 per night for RV's. We have electrical and water, but no sewer hookups. Tents are \$15 for up to four people for members, \$18 for non-members. Pets are \$2 per night. Pets are not allowed in any of the buildings, pool area or sleeping rooms at any time.

Please include your full phone number, address and lodge name and number when registering. If you have e-mail, please enclose your e-mail address. It is so much faster and cheaper if I need to talk to you. As soon as the supply lists are available from the teachers, I will send them as I receive your registration form and check. **ABSOLUTELY NO E-MAIL RESERVATION REQUESTS.** I need the check and registration form together. Be sure to send a self addressed stamped envelope for your supply list and class confirmation information if you do not have e-mail. *I will not be sending you a supply list unless you send me a self-addressed, stamped envelope or your e-mail address with your registration form.* I use Microsoft Word running on an XP program and all attachments will be attached from that program.

The cost of the seminar will be \$80 for registration which includes the class and wood piece all base coated and ready to go, the fire hall rent, clean up and the meals. There will be \$25 cancellation fee, but absolutely no cancellations after October 5. Registration fees (less cancellation fee) can be refunded if you have to cancel up to October 5 if there is someone on the waiting list who wants your space. It is difficult for people on the waiting list to take your place if they do not have at least three weeks to make their plans. Melanie Souza will do our cooking. You met her in April as she assisted Debbie. The cost for food for the weekend is included in the \$80 registration fee.
