King Harald V and Queen Sonja Visit the United States

As you may have heard, Minnesota just wrapped up the Royal visit of King Harald V and Queen Sonja of Norway. Over the course of Their eight day visit, Their Majesties visited St Olaf, Augsburg College, the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Enger Tower in Duluth and a Sons of Norway lodge!

During Their time here, They had a chance to meet many Minnesotans and Sons of Norway members, which obviously had an impact because at a banquet in his honor, the King went so far as to say “And I am grateful to the Sons of Norway and the many other organizations that preserve Norwegian heritage and traditions. Norway looks to its Sons and Daughters in the United States as a bridge between our two cultures.”

If that weren't enough, Their Majesties also spent time at a Sons of Norway lodge in Duluth, where they were introduced to members and our International Board of Directors. During the event, there were speeches by various dignitaries, including our very own International President, Dan Rude. After that, King Harald V and Queen Sonja were escorted around the room and introduced to a number of members in attendance.

Sons of Norway was proud to be asked to play a significant role in Their visit and looking back, we can say without a doubt that this Royal visit was a great success.

Ban Hails Refugee Champion Fridtjof Nansen As Bearer Of World's Conscience

Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon today hailed the renowned Norwegian explorer and refugee champion Fridtjof Nansen, on the 150th anniversary of his birth, as the very embodiment of the world's collective conscience that brings succour to the downtrodden, the afflicted and the oppressed.

“The greatest barriers in life are not walls around buildings, but walls around hearts,” he told a ceremony in Oslo, Norway's capital, commemorating the “great global citizen” who was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, served as the League of Nations' first High Commissioner for Refugees, and has given his name to the UN High Commissioner for Refugees' annual Nansen Refugee Award for outstanding work on behalf of refugees.

“Gaze on the face of Fridtjof Nansen. It is the very embodiment of strength and human fortitude,” Mr. Ban said, stressing that the collective conscience springs from a basic human instinct for solidarity—the recognition that we are one human family on this planet Earth. “The man was a hero, to be sure. He climbed high mountains and traversed the Arctic vastness.”

For those of us at the UN, however, he is a hero for the larger and enduring example he set. Like few others, he helped give birth to our modern collective conscience. Amid the revolutions and conflict of the last century, he was there – the first High

Commissioner for Refugees at the League of Nations.

“When Jews and other stateless refugees fled the Nazi persecution, the Nansen Pass was a ticket to survival. Today, the United Nations feeds and shelters a new generation of the homeless and unwanted. We do so in the name and spirit of Fridtjof Nansen. We do so in the name of our collective conscience.”

Mr. Ban, who was in Oslo to attend an energy conference aimed at mobilizing private capital and public resources to bring sustainable energy to three billion people that still lack it, also paid tribute to the dozens of people who died on 22 July as a result of that day's bomb attack in Oslo and gun assault on a nearby holiday island.

“Norway responded to devastation with democracy, to intolerance with inclusion,” he said at the site. “Norway is grieving – but Norway is giving. I am confident you will continue reaching out to the world and lifting up humanity. There is no more fitting memorial than that.”

During the day Mr. Ban held bilateral meetings with Prime Minister Jens Stoltenberg and other top officials, discussing Libya and the Middle East, next year's Rio+20 Conference on sustainable Development, and strengthening the UN to meet today's complex challenges. He praised the Government's commitment to multilateralism, and later addressed the Norwegian Parliament's committees on foreign affairs and constitutional affairs.

Wanda Reiersgaard Collins was born May 13, 1927 in Petaluma, California. When she was young her family moved to Thief River Falls, Minnesota where Wanda graduated from high school. As a young adult she attended Santa Rosa Junior College in California, where she was named outstanding woman graduate of California by the Alpha Gamma Sigma Society. She earned a Bachelors and a Master of Social Work Degrees from UC Berkeley.

She worked as a psychiatric social worker in a San Francisco mental health clinic, a field instructor of graduate students at UC Berkeley School of Social Welfare, Dean of the College of Social Work at CSU, Sacramento where she continued her career as a Professor of Social Work. She was an advocate for poor and disadvantaged people.

Wanda was a leader in the National Association of Social Work. In 1965, she joined a protest action in support of social workers who defied punitive practices, became a Vice President of the San Francisco Chapter

(1966), President of the California Council of Chapters in 1970s, President of the California Chapter (1987-88) and Board of Directors of the National Association of Social Workers (1973-75).

Wanda Collins was a long-time member of our lodge, and enjoyed several visits to Norway. She was active in Viking Sisters, and became more active in other lodge events after her retirement. She was a long-time member of the Lutheran Church of Our Redeemer in Carmichael and was a former member of Saint John's Lutheran Church where she sang in the choir, was active in the church activities, and served as President of Women of the ELCA.

Wanda was passionate about her love of animals, especially her dogs, most recently Sheba and Hannah. Her care for animals led her to become a vegetarian, which she practiced and supported for thirty-plus years.

Wanda is survived by her sister Linda Barney of Leesburg, Florida and her niece Sue Hornik of Bellport, New York.

Each summer, a prime use for the camp is to serve as the home for the 6th District's Language & Heritage Camp.

At the 6th District Convention in Sacramento in June of 1996, then President Karl Eikeberg arranged for the delegates and guests to visit and see first hand the beautiful and wonderful asset that we all have in Camp Norge, at Alta, California. The 46+ acres of Camp Norge are a recreational wonderland with a main house, three dormitories and several small cabins that are used for sleeping facilities, a social hall for preparation of meals, a swimming pool, and other opportunities for various recreational activities.

The meadow offers facilities for RV camping and tenting as well for picnics, social get-togethers and fun and games, including a swimming pool that doubles as a fire-fighting reservoir. The wooded areas offer opportunities for hiking and exploring. Even though you are close by Interstate 80, there is a sense of seclusion that is special. The camp has its own water supply, as well as the amenities offered by electricity and bottled gas, and a year-round resident hostess/manager. The camp has an on-site cell phone tower.

One of the past International Directors of Sons of Norway, Asbjørn Røstad, looked out over this beautiful vista in 1996 and made the remark that he would like to see a program set up to help with the maintenance of the camp—always a challenge. Someone else mentioned a plan that had worked for other organizations, and the idea of a Century Club was born. Individuals dedicated to the camp's growth and future would join the club with annual dues of \$100.

The idea grew and meetings were held with nine members making up the organizing committee, later known as the Founders. They prepared the By-Laws and elected the initial officers: President, Roger Merrill 6-50; Vice President, Karin Brevig, 6-25; Secretary, Sherrill Swenson, 6-64; Treasurer, Joe Rasmussen 6-64; and Publicity Director, Lynn Lende 6-64. The initial Directors at large were Ola Brevig, 6-25; Ordale Johnson, 6-68; Bob Olson, 6-50; and Asbjørn Røstad, 6-24. Meetings are held on a regular basis twice a year at Norway Hall, Norrona #50, Van Nuys, CA, and once per biennium at Camp Norge.
