ARE YOU 75 IN 2014?



If you are reaching the age of 75 in 2014, let us say, first of all – congratulations! Here are some of the moments and eras in Norwegian history to which you were a personal witness. Of course, we could only list a smattering. What were some Norwegian events significant to you that are not listed here? Let us hear about them and maybe we can recite them in a future edition.

1940 – Germany invades and occupies Norway.

1945 – Norway joins the UN as a charter member. Trygve Lie becomes Secretary-General thereof.

1947 - The country receives \$400M in reconstruction funds from the Marshall Plan.

1947 – Kon-Tiki.

1949 – Norway joins NATO.

1950s – Huge hydro-electric development in Norway. The country begins a sustained economic recovery.

1952 – Hosted Winter Olympics in Oslo. Stein Eriksen wins the Giant Slalom.

1960s – Norwegian oil and gas industry develops in North Sea; Norway becomes an energy exporter.

1972 – Norway votes against joining the Common Market, and in 1994 against joining the EU.

1993 – US/Israel/Palestine accords negotiated in Oslo. Remember, later, the famous photo of Yassar Arafat and Yitzhak Rabin shaking hands in front of Bill Clinton?

2000s – Norway mediates between Sri Lankan government and Tamil separatists.

2003 – Pregnant women warned not to eat whale meat (chemicals). Various whale-harvesting controversies.

2010 – Peace Prize squabble with China.

2011 – Norway experiences a right-wing mass shooting that devastates the country.

Today – So many items that could be reported: chess and sports heroes, humanitarian efforts, etc. Today Norway is generally regarded as having the highest standard of living in the world (The USA is, at best, fourth.). Must be why it is so expensive there.

ANOTHER "NORWEGIAN" FLICK HITS IT!



Disney's "**Frozen**", where a winter animated Norwegian landscape plays a huge part, is nominated for two Golden Globe awards. Trapped in an eternal winter world, the two main characters in "Frozen" fight to bring back summer. The movie has been picked as one of the candidates in the Best Animated Film category in the 71st edition of Golden Globe Awards in Los Angeles on January 12th.

To create a convincing frozen landscape, Disney's animators visited a place that knows a lot about ice and snow: Norway. As a result, Norwegian landmarks such as the famous wooden buildings on the Bergen waterfront and Oslo's Akershus Fortress find their way into the winter world of the new movie. Trolls, lutefisk and the Northern Lights also make appearanc-

es in the film. The main characters have Norwegian names such as Sven, Anna and Olaf.

Norwegian actor **Thorbjørn Harr**, who did voice work for the Norwegian version, is pleased to see that movies are bringing Norwegian nature to the world. "I think the Norwegian movie industry as a whole has wanted to use movies to promote the country to a larger extent. This is very good," he told NRK.

The movie premiered in the United States the day before Thanksgiving and grossed \$93 million for the five-day holiday weekend. As of December 29th it had a domestic gross of \$248 million, versus a \$150 million budgeted cost. It opened in Norway (entitled "Frost") on Christmas Day, but box office performance there had not yet been released as of the writing of this article.

December 25, 2013 – cold hands, helpful passengers, warm heart. It is amazing how the weather can change in five days down here. My nose has peeled from the last two trips and all the sun, but this trip has been a horse of a different color. I had a great five hours in town on the 20th, in that I went shopping for two outfits to dance with the crew (last night and New Year's Eve), went swimming, got a really good hair cut, and had a nice lunch, did internet at a café.

The weather gods have forsaken us this trip, but we have a cheerful group of passengers, more kids and families than on the first four trips combined. Everybody watches out for a horde of high-energy kids, like living in a small town, many eyes. We had a normal Drake Passage, and this group seemed to tolerate more swells than past groups. We got to Barrientos Island in time to land, with high winds and tough seas....

Dec. 23rd: I drove partnered with Shane at Enterprise Island, and had one of the best cruises I have driven. Shane has a good way of telling me how to handle speed and tough conditions, and he radioed me, put the passengers back in the boat and put the nose of the boat into the wind, when we went looking for whales. We were the first two boats at two humpback whales, where I turned off my engine and just drifted...

That evening we did the rehearsal for the crew Christmas Talent Show; I had asked the captain if I could sing with the crew, and he said of course, that was the way it should be. It was hilarious in parts. Herman and I had practiced O Holy Night several times, and it went without a hitch, he sang the verse and I sang alto for the chorus. Then I sang Christmas carols with the crew doing the harmony part. The rehearsal was as much fun as the performance on Christmas...

I finished this section last night, hectic but good trip, tough weather. Will finish the rest of the trip on the Drake Passage. We had wonderful whales on the last Drake, more later, Merry Christmas a little late, hugs, Carol.

As you can see, Carol has been having entirely too much fun for a mature member of a Norwegian lodge to have. We will have to find her a really crummy job to do when she returns...

In memory of
IRENE KARLSTAD
 Long-time member of the lodge was 93



More than a little bit of the history of Roald Amundsen lodge is fading with the passing of Irene Karlstad. Veteran members of the lodge do not know how long she and her husband, Jerry, who died in 2010, had been members, but it seems they were members before any of them can remember, and we know it has been at least since some time in the 1950s.

Irene was from a large pioneer family in Yankton, South Dakota. Jerry was from North Dakota. They regularly returned to the Dakotas for Karlstad and Akland family reunions. The latest reunion she attended was just last summer and was an opportunity for her to visit with her two remaining brothers (she was one of 10 siblings) and numerous nieces, nephews and other relatives.

Some of our members have reminisced about Irene’s tireless work at the Torsk and Lutefisk dinners back when the lodge still had its own hall. She was one of the main chefs when it came to preparing meatballs and coleslaw for these meals, and she was the “champion” rosette baker. “Every dinner and every bake sale had rosettes that she had made and they were truly the best,” remembers Tove-Lise Miller. Jim and Florence Smith remember that Irene was running the kitchen when they first joined the lodge. Former lodge president Cindy Hayashi considered her to be “a mentor and a friend.”

Janet Moe reminisces: “Joyce, Irene's daughter, and I have been friends since 5th grade. Jerry was my Sunday School teacher. Irene had a beautiful alto voice and she sang hymns everyday even up to her last days. She introduced me to rosemary and spoiled me and everyone else around her table with wonderful dinners and hospitality. Her homemade Norwegian specialties were rosettes and lefse. In the last few years Joyce did most of the ‘heavy labor’ in this endeavor but you can be sure Irene was supervising at all times.”

Irene, circa 1999, with the late Ellen Carson, installing President John Reppe-Fisher, also deceased. Irene was always an enthusiastic participant at officer installations.

Many know that Irene was adept at many types of crafts. As late as November of this year she was selling her quilts and lap robes at a craft show. At the same time, she was always generously “gifting” people with her beautiful and practical creations.

Some final thoughts from Janet Moe: “When my mother was widowed in 1995 Irene got her involved in the social activities at Palms Mobile Home Park. They played bunco and card games and went to various activities there. My mother was the driver and Irene the navigator as they went hither and yon enjoying their retirement together. When my mother passed on in 2005 I became Irene's "adopted daughter" and I appreciated her friendship and love very much. It will be hard for my car not to drift naturally over to the Palms to share coffee, conversation and cards with my dear friend but I think she is very glad to see her beloved Jerry again.”

Services were held on January 6th at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Sacramento. The church was full.

HEY, YOU CAL GRADS! – did you know that **Sather Gate** and **Sather Tower** are named for **Peder Pedersen Sæther**, a Norwegian? He was born in Odal, in the county of Hedmark, on the farm of Nordstun Nedre Sæther. He was a fisherman before immigrating to New York City in 1932 and joining the banking firm of Drexel & Co. Later, he and a business partner named **Edward Church** moved to San Francisco and started the banking firm known as Sather and Church, which was later absorbed by the Bank of California. Sather was a trustee of the College of Califor-
