DISTRICT SIX CONVENTION WRAP-UP

Seven members of Roald Amundsen Lodge attended the 32nd District Six Convention of the Sons of Norway in Palm Springs, California, June 22-25. The convention was hosted by Solskinn Lodge #150 from Palm Desert.

The delegates were **Cecelia Byrd, Ron Byrd, Donna Gordon, Tove-Lise Miller, Steve Rosenthal, and Florence Smith.** Also attending was **Jim Smith**, a Past District Six President.

The highlight of the convention for the Sacramento Lodge was the election of **Tove-Lise Miller** to the office of **Zone 1 Director**. It was one of two offices that was contested with more than one nominee. She won over **Carl Ingvoldstad** from Vikings of the Lake Lodge. Tove-Lise will serve a two year term on the District Six Board until the next convention in 2016.

New District Six officers also elected for two year terms include: **Mary Beth Ingvoldstad, President; Luella Grangaard, Vice President; Nancy Madson, Secretary; Bob Sather, Treasurer; Reegan Moen, Public Relations Chairman, and Pamela Stutrud Groth, Cultural Director.**

An amendment was made to the District Bylaws to include the additional position of Cultural Director on the Board. District Six was the only domestic district in the international organization without such a position.

Lyle Berge of Colorado, the outgoing District President, was elected to be the District Six International Director and serve on the international board.

Roald Amundsen Lodge President, Steve Rosenthal, played a prominent role as chairman of the Super 6th Committee, which presented several resolutions to the delegates to be voted on. The committee spent time

before the start of the convention analyzing the resolutions, which had been submitted by others, and then revising them as needed before the voting took place.

Roald Amundsen also received two achievement awards. A Silver Award for second place was presented for 2012 to the Lodge and to the Lodge President for that year **David Bai-**

ley. A second Silver Award for second place was also presented for 2013 to the Lodge and to the Lodge President for that year, Steve Rosenthal. The awards were part of the "Lodge of the Year" competition.

Two district members were elected to be delegates to the upcoming International Convention in Jacksonville, Florida, in August. They were **Carl Ingvoldstad and Luella Grangaard.**

EXCELLENT NORWEGIAN MOVIE ON NETFLIX


Ok, it's not Norwegian, it's German.

But it takes place mostly in Norway, and features Norwegian actors. *Two Lives* is a 2012 German drama film that explores the history of the *Lebensborn* or war children, born in Norway and raised in Germany. There is quite a real history involved here that is most interesting—and tragic.

The movie explores the lives of a grown woman who had claimed to have escaped from East Germany, where she was raised, and her Norwegian mother, with whom she is reunited.

Although somewhat complicated, the film is exciting and interesting. It was nominated for the International Debut Award at the Göteborg International Film Fes-

tival and was selected in 2013 as the German entry for the Best Foreign Language Film at the 86th Academy Awards. One of the actors is **Liv Ullmann**, who at age 75 looks as comely and as photogenic as ever. She plays a grandmother role.

The family of former lodge member, Sharon Mahnken, donated a handmade doll and several items of Norwegian jewelry in her memory to the camp, which were sold in a silent auction that raised several hundred dollars.

Camp Norge is changing its goals after a trial time in which it attempted to boost income by attracting non-members of SON to use the camping facilities. The camp is now open only to SON members. Those on the Recreation Board praised the camp and its facilities and encouraged members in the district to attend the various activities held there during the year.

A special guest from the Minneapolis headquarters was **Eivind Heiberg**, the CEO of Sons of Norway. Also attending and speaking was **Jon Tehven**, International Secretary, from Iowa. **Janie Kelly**, the International Director for District Six, also was a speaker. The Norwegian consulate from Los Angeles greeted the delegates, as did several local officials.

Dinner highlights included a bunad fashion show one evening and Norwegian folk dancing by the Scandi Folk Dancers of Southern California another evening.

When the convention ended our six delegates had a better understanding of the international organization and of the Foundation, as well as of District operations. They came home with new zeal and enthusiasm and motivation to make Roald Amundsen a better lodge in the coming years. In short, a good time was had by all! – **Ron Byrd, Delegate**

IN MEMORIAM...



Long time Sons of Norway member **Arlene Berg** passed away this last June 23rd at the age of 87 after a period of hospice care. Lodge members who have been around a while will remember that Arlene often provided our piano accompaniment at meetings and events. She and current member **Bob Dahl** enjoyed playing together, and she often rode to lodge meetings with **Jim and Florence Smith**, who lived near her.

Arlene was born in Benson County, North Dakota and spent all of her life surrounded by music. She was instrumental in beginning the California State Old Time Fiddlers' Assn. in 1966. She also played the Accordion, Old Time Fiddle, Stand-up Bass Fiddle, Guitar and Organ. Through the years she gave many Piano and Fiddle lessons and played piano for the Golden Tones who sang for several nursing homes in the area. She also loved to dance and was a member of the West Coast Swing Club.

When Arlene wasn't playing a musical instrument, she was in her yard tending her gardens, painting, creating wooden furniture, sewing and baking. She travelled as often as possible and brought her musical talents all over the country. She spent many winters with friends sharing their music in Arizona and the southern deserts of California. Then would travel to Weiser, Idaho for Fiddle Contests where she met and made so many more friends.

Arlene is survived by her sister Lorraine Larson of Santa Rosa and brother Mervin Stenberg of Vancouver, WA, her son Ronald Lommen of Concord, NH, a daughter Linda Swihart of Chico, a niece Julie Borg of the Sacramento area, and also by grandchildren. A memorial service was scheduled for this past July 27th at the Orangevale Grange building. – *Based in part on information published in the Sacramento Bee.*

“VISIT” A PRAIRIE NOVEL...

Author O. E. Rolvaag, an emigrant from Norway, powerfully describes in *Giants in the Earth* (1927) the adversity of 1870s pioneer life. He based the novel in part on his experiences in the Dakota Territory (now South Dakota), casting the radiant and terrible prairie as a major character.

Rolvaag's settlers, living in sod huts, must battle hunger, loneliness, snowed-in winters, wild summer storms, and locusts ravaging painstakingly grown crops. The lives of Per Hansa and his wife, Beret, and their four children reveal the human cost of claiming a quarter acre. Per Hansa is a man of great determination, but Beret Hansa simply cannot set roots in this foreign soil and slowly loses her reason.

Most sod structures have morphed back into the prairie-lands, but a surviving sod house (right) stands at **South Dakota's Prairie Homestead**, 3 miles from I-90 at Exit 131. By peculiar coincidence (probably beyond Per Hansa's wildest fantasies), the **Minuteman Missile National Historic Site** (above right), also at Exit 131, was established in 1999 by the National

Park Service.

The Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre provides insight into settlers' lives and is free to active duty and retired service-members and their families this summer.

IMMIGRANTS AND NORWEGIANS CLIMB NORWAY'S HIGHEST MOUNTAIN IN AN INTEGRATION PROJECT

American participant almost creates an international incident with his behavior.



Over the past several years more than 6,000 people from different nations have completed the hike up to Norway's highest mountain, Galdhøpiggen, in the integration project *Til Topps* ("To the top"). "We did it," cheered both immigrants and Norwegians when they managed to reach the top of Galdhøpiggen (2469m) on Saturday, the 23rd of July.

The hike took place on both Friday and Saturday, and was a cooperative effort sponsored by the Directorate of Integration and Diversity (IMDi), The Norwegian Tourist Association, and the Red Cross. The goal of the event, called *Til topps* ("To the top"), is to help promote integration work among asylum seekers, settled refugees and other

immigrants living in Norway.

The Crown Prince family has also previously participated in the event, as well as Prime Minister Erna Solberg. "Those who participate for the first time experience a tremendous sense of achievement. To stand on Norway's rooftop for those who are not used to being in the mountains is a big deal," says Åse Havnelid, Secretary General of the Red Cross.

Havnelid explains that the purpose of the hike is to get to know Norwegian nature, as well as make new friends. Even though the hike from Juvasshytta to Galdhøpiggen is difficult and demanding, she thinks that the wildness and beauty of it make it worth it.

"They might have many eventless days. Then it is good to have certain goals to go after and experiences like this. Today they have done something that not many Norwegians have done, they have climbed to the top of Galdhøpiggen," the Prime Minister said when she participated in the event in 2012.

The event was marred by the behavior of one boorish American who claimed to be of Norwegian descent and who gave his name as **Dick Tracysen**. He said he was reporting for some obscure publication in California, but he had no computer or other such device with him. In fact, his pack was mostly filled with bottles of California wines, which he generously shared with many of the young women on the hike, "in the name of world peace and understanding." Several mornings in a row he put on his crampons in reverse and attempted to scale the mountain backwards, which did not amuse climb officials.

Once the top of the mountain was scaled, he attempted to demonstrate his sympathy for other cultures by shouting "GOOOOOOOAL!" This started a small avalanche which partially buried a member of the Crown Prince's family. Mr. Tracysen's credentials were revoked on the spot and he was taken down the mountain strapped in a gurney sled normally used for injured climbers. The intrepid reporter immediately left for Iceland where he was scheduled to give **Carol Francis** zodiac driving lessons.
