

NORWEGIAN HUNTER SHOOTS TWO MOOSE IN A ZOO!

Investigative Journalist from Navigator uncovers new facts in the case!

Talk about a twofer. As widely reported in the Norwegian press and elsewhere, a hunter in Norway shot dead two moose with one shot before realizing moments later, allegedly, that he was shooting through the fence of a wildlife park!

The animals were in the Polar Park Arctic Wildlife Center in northern Norway, about two hour's drive south of the city of Tromso, above the Arctic Circle. On October 7th the hunter was with a group hunting moose with specially trained dogs at the boundary of the park. The group claimed that one of the dogs went under the fence into the park after the scent of one of the huge animals and the hunter took a shot. His bullet passed through one animal, killing it, and lodged in the stomach of a second, which later had to be euthanized.

Polar Park CEO **Heinz Strathmann** found out when the leader of the hunting group came to the park to tell staff what had happened. "I was surprised. I had my mouth open for a while," Strathmann said. "This has never happened before -- and I don't think it will happen ever again. It is a one of a kind." Polar Park was not intending to press charges against the hunter because it was an accident, Strathmann said, but the wildlife park is asking that the hunters pay its costs for replacing the animals (\$3,500).

So, just as the case seemed to be closed, enter **Dick Tracysen**, Investigative Reporter. In a brilliant piece of creative investigative journalism, Tracysen revealed that this same Norwegian hunter had been in Zimbabwe this past July and was a member of the hunting safari containing the American from Minneapolis, **Walter Palmer**, who killed a famous lion, **Cecil**, that the hunters had lured over the boundary of Hwange National Park! "It seems that hunting is really good around the edges of national parks and wildlife centers," observed Tracysen, wryly.

This revelation, of course, reopens the Norwegian case. The man could be prosecuted under an article in Norway's Wildlife Act that regulates humane hunting. The punishment would be a fine, and in the most severe cases prison. Tracysen has been given a case of Norwegian Aquavit by the local office at the Norwegian Environment Agency as a token of admiration for his brilliant investigative reporting. However, since he currently is an out-patient at the Betty Ford Clinic, he has passed this award on to the staff of the Navigator, who surely deserve it for the extraordinary work they do with that publication.

SONS OF NORWAY \$CHOLARSHIP DEADLINES WILL BE UPON YOU BEFORE YOU REALIZE IT!

Sons of Norway offers various scholarship programs to members. There are some important deadlines for 2016 scholarships that will be here before you know it. The application processes take time. For instance, letters of recommendation are often required, and busy people may not always be able to write them to comport with your scheduling needs. We recommend that anyone interested in these great opportunities go to the Sons of Norway website and start the application process now! The deadline for many of the scholarships listed below is March 1st, 2016, and the programs will not accept incomplete submissions!

Astrid Cates/Myrtle Beinhauer Scholarships. These are for applicants enrolling in post-secondary training or education including trade school, vocational school or college and must be current Sons of Norway members, children or grandchildren of current Sons of Norway members. Annual deadline is March 1st.

Oslo International Summer School Scholarships. This fund offers two scholarships each year for students to attend the Oslo International Summer School. Visit <u>The University of Oslo</u> to learn more on the program. Annual deadline is March 1st.

King Olav V Norwegian-American Heritage Fund Scholarships. The fund welcomes applications from Americans, 18 years or older, with a plan of studies to focus on exploring his/her interest in Norwegian heritage or in modern Norway at an institution of higher learning. Annual deadline is March 1st.

Helen Tronvold Norwegian Folk High School Scholarships. Fund cross-cultural experiences for youth. Three \$2,000 scholarships to attend a Norwegian Folk High School. Annual deadline is March 1st.

Lund Fund. These scholarships fund study abroad experiences through accredited, post high school, educational institutions. Annual deadline is May 1st.

Nancy Lorraine Jensen Memorial Fund. This fund encourages female American citizens between 17 and 35 to apply for financial assistance for programs in chemistry or physics, or in chemical, electrical or mechanical engineering. The candidate, or parent/grandparent of the candidate, must be a current member of Sons of Norway. Annual deadline is April 1st.

Warne – Eng Scholarship Fund. A relatively new scholarship, for studying in Norway. No age restrictions, older members! Deadline is April 1st.

Again, for more information on each scholarship, the qualifying requirements and application forms, visit the Sons of Norway Home Page at www.sofn.com. Under the "Foundation" tab you will find a link to the Scholarships page. The summaries presented here are for your convenience and are not comprehensive. Check the website to confirm all such information!


